Building a Strong Community

In the heart of a neighbourhood, tucked away in the corner of a North Vancouver schoolyard lives a special place for families — Westcoast Energy Children's Centre. It offers a broad range of programs for parents & their preschoolers, providing valuable resources to promote healthy development of children through the critical early years.

"We are so lucky to be able to participate in these programs... I have friends that live in other areas of the lower mainland that don't... and you can see the difference in the children and parents."

Westcoast Energy Children's Centre was brought to life by a generous multi-year contribution from Westcoast Energy (now Duke Energy). A \$65,000 per year contribution has nurtured the warm, bright, welcoming place staffed with professionals and volunteers. Open five days and one evening each week, families have access to resources they need, close to their homes.

"Having other mothers to talk to and ask questions about my joys, concerns and frustrations has been extremely valuable to me, as a new, 20 year old mom." At the end of March 2004, Westcoast Energy's funding support will end and without sponsorship, the Centre cannot be sustained and will be unable to serve the community. Family Services of the North Shore is actively seeking a strong new financial commitment to fund this valuable place into the future.

The Family Next Door

People come to us for help, often as the place of last resort. They have tried everything, turned to everyone they know and trust, and exhausted the resources of the wider community around them.

Carey, not her real name, came to Canada with her young son and her husband who struggled with alcoholism. Shortly after their arrival her husband died. Her son entered Grade 1 in a foreign country, started to have problems at school, withdrew, failed to participate, and acted sullen. Carey, trying to deal with her loss, was unable to cope with this confused and angry child. She turned to Family Services for help.

Given the chance to sit down and talk, Carey's son acted out his story with puppets. "I just want you to listen," he told the counsellor, as he began to recount tales of a small character up against incredible odds. Through counselling Carey's son began to settle down; both he and his mother were able to understand how difficult the transition had been for both of them. Clearly their worlds had been turned upside down. Far more secure, they now face their future with hope and confidence.

A Safe Place To Turn

"Everyday, small miracles unfold in the lives of those we serve as they work to gradually undo the legacies of fear, anger and loss that they carry with them," says Mark Morissette, Director of Clinical Programs. "The gift of a safe place to turn to, an outstretched hand, a listening ear is often all it takes to discover that new beginnings are possible. There is not a day goes by that I am not moved and made more deeply aware of the difference we are making in the lives of those who turn to us."

I Hope

On a cold rainy day in May more than 400 people attended our first annual I HOPE event to raise funds and create awareness of Family Services of the North Shore. We were gratified by the response. At the end of the day close to \$400,000 in cash and pledges was committed. Our objective of being able to expand our clinical services and reduce our waitlist was fulfilled.

Each year, the Christmas Bureau distributes toys and hampers to close to 600 families and 800 children. Our 125 volunteers serve seniors, disabled individuals, both single and two-parent families, some new to Canada, many facing extreme financial difficulty.

The Christmas Bureau works from Christmas to Christmas soliciting donations and supporting the work of Family Services of the North Shore.
